From the Superintendent

I can't believe we're over half way through the school year already. We celebrated our 100th day of school on Tuesday February 13th.

The Career Center is officially open. Thanks to the collaborative work being done between Mrs. Trabucco and the Guidance Department. We have begun offering a guest speaker series, relative field trips, and have rolled out the student internship program. Area Superintendents visited the Career Center earlier this month. They were all excited to hear more about what Marathon is doing and offering students. This is an amazing compliment to what we're building. There is a buzz amongst the community, staff, and students and we're very proud of that.

We're heading into the playoffs in Athletics. Mr. James has confirmed that we will be well-represented in the postseason, as all of our programs have advanced. In addition to our teams working towards successful team records, this season we've watched Abby Ensign achieve 1000 career points; the Cheer program is on the rise and placed at three Section IV Tournaments, and competed in the IAC Championships on February 10th; Indoor Track and Field has numerous state qualifiers; Wrestling placed 3rd at the IAC Championships; and in Girls Wrestling, Mel Sutton earned a spot on the podium at the NYSPHSAA Girls Tournament. What an amazing resume by not only our student athletes, but also the coaches that lead those programs.

Our music department continues to grow in band and chorus. They are currently rehearsing for the school musical, "Emma", that will be held March 7, 8, and 9 in the Jr.-Sr. High School Auditorium. I'm hopeful everyone will be able to attend and support our talented students on at least one of these days.

We are currently in the heart of budget season. Our Public Budget Forum was on Wednesday, February 7th. The state has come through for a second year in a row with aid to our district. Although we did not receive the overall state aid that was forecasted, we feel confident in presenting a responsible budget focused on enhancing opportunities for our students. There will be budget updates at all BOE meetings lead-

ing up to the Annual Hearing and state-wide budget vote in May.

We are also engaged in the work of developing our next three-year Strategic Plan. I provided an update to the Board at the last meeting. Thanks to all of you who participated in our strategic plan survey that closed in early February. There will be additional updates and opportunities for participation as we move through the process. Time will be spent working through the feedback received from the comprehensive school community including staff, parents, students, and local stakeholders.

Transportation News

Extra Eyes and Ears on the Safety Team

Bus drivers make sure traffic has come to a halt before letting students exit. Students also have learned to wait for the bus driver's signal to tell them when it is safe to cross the road. However, traffic has become so unpredictable that these steps are not enough to keep children safe from harm. We have had instances when motorists have had plenty of time to stop for the red lights on the bus, but they did not. Also, some drivers

stop and then start to move again even though the lights continue to flash

We are teaching students to put their own eyes and ears to work to be aware of careless drivers. In addition to waiting for a signal that it is safe to cross the road, students are now learning to make a second stop when they reach the driver's side of the bus. The additional stop allows them to look around the bus to see if any vehicles are ignoring the red flashing lights.



Despite laws and safety guidelines, some people still text or talk on their phones while driving. There are times they become so distracted that when they finally notice a bus in front of them, it is too late to stop. Sometimes these people actually swerve around the right-hand side of buses. To address this problem, we are teaching students to "Check Before You Step" off the bus. When they are on the last step, they pause and look before exiting the bus.

Our students are learning skills that will benefit them throughout their lives. They are essential partners in our safety team.

Appleby News and Notes

Wonderful things are taking place in our classrooms here at Appleby Elementary and I am proud of all of our students! We have reached the midway point of the school year and I can't say enough about the students, faculty and staff here at Appleby and the tremendous job they have all done this school year. If you have questions regarding your child's education, please let me know so that I have an opportunity to discuss this with you.

Two of the most important links to student success is for students to be well-rested and prepared for each day of learning. Video games and screen time can make that a challenge, especially with the additional use of laptop use this year in schools and for academics. Many students play video games daily, and while some research shows that a few hours of video gaming a week can have benefits, the impacts can be negative when it's too much (nine or more hours a week), or when screen time and gaming impact sleep. I am not asking anyone to remove all video game consoles and/or tablets, but I am suggesting that you find a balance between screen time and other activities.

Gaming provides many pros: following directions, problem-solving, pattern recognition, multitasking and quick thinking, but at a cost: lack of sleep, inability to socialize, mood swings, not getting proper nutrition or skipping meals, not being attentive in school, not completing homework, being tired and/or falling asleep in class.

To help minimize the negative impacts mentioned above, here are a few healthy tips:

- two hours before bedtime should be kept screen-free. This keeps the excitement of gaming or the blue light emitted from devices from disrupting sleep.
- If video gaming is going to happen, try to limit it. Keep it in the earlier hours of the afternoon and evening. Some quality time with the people at home and the world around them is the best way for students to spend those hours right before bedtime.
- A book, some quiet music and time away from screen are good ways to ease into better sleep at night and be ready for the next day.

Physical Exams

Effective, 7/1/2018, The State of New York changed the mandated years for health exams. Health exams are now required in grades UPK, K, 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th, and 11th. In addition, only the approved NYS Health Examination Form may be used to document health exams to provide consistency across the state. The form can be found on the Marathon web site or you can call and request a form to be sent home with your child.

The School Health Program at Appleby and the High School would like to offer health exams to all students each year. If you would like to schedule a physical for your child please call Carol at Appleby 849-3180 or Teresa at the HS 849-3900. If your child has had a physical this year or is planning to have one elsewhere, please be sure to have your physician use the approved form and send the office a copy for your child's school health record The School Health Program can again see enrolled kids from home. This means if your child stays home you can call either office and come into school for just the appointment. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact the School Health Program at the numbers above.




